Meet our new newsletter designer, Chad Brown



The Oregon Council is involved with a number of shows in the next three months. I hope that you will be able to attend all of them. The shows are great places to see new gear, find new places to fish and test your fly fishing skills.

The first is the Pacific Northwest Sportsmen's Show, February 4-8 at the Portland Expo. This show has everything related to hunting, fishing, camping and boating. There is a casting pond with all types of programs and instruction opportunities, along with fly tying demonstrations. There will also be a casting competition for accuracy and distance. I tried this last year and got into the finals, but was out early. This particular casting competition requires you to use casts that you might actually use while fishing. The Oregon Council will have a booth with casting instructors and lots of information about what we are doing in Oregon and throughout the Federation. The next is the Fly Fishing Show in Portland, February 14 and 15 at the Oregon Convention Center. You can get more information about the show at www.flyfishingshow.com. The Council will have a booth along with casting instructors and information about the Federation.

The most important show coming up is the 21st Annual NW Fly Tyer and Fly Fishing Expo, March 13 and 14 at the Linn County Expo Center in Albany. This is the Oregon Council's biggest event of the year. As you can see in this issue, there are lots of fly tyers and classes for you to see. You will find the Expo to be one of the best values for fly fishing education around. The cost is \$5 a person, but is free for all FFF members. Classes are a reasonable \$15 a class for most classes. There will be a great youth program as well as a fun casting tournament. There will be raffles, silent auctions and an oral auction on Saturday with great trips, art work and fly plates available to the highest bidder. This is a great opportunity to see old friends and meet new ones at one of the nation's premier fly fishing expos. Crooked River Study to be presented at Expo

RIVER MACROINVERTEBRATES BY RED BAND TROUT AND MOUNTAIN WHITEFISH.

John R. Anderson, Prof. of Entomology (Emeritus) and Member, Central Oregon Flyfishers. With the assistance of volunteers from the Central Oregon Flyfishers this recent 15-month study, partly funded by a grant from the Oregon Council FFF, assessed the diversity and abundance of macroinvertebrates collected in river bottom and drift net samples and in complete stomach contents of Redband Trout (RBT) and Mt. Whitefish (WF).

Typical winter macroinvertebrate densities were 2,000 to 3,000 individuals per square meter of river bottom; summer densities ranged from 5,000 to 9,000 individuals per square meter of river bottom. American Grannom larvae and Whitefish eggs were the two most predominant prey in the winter diet of RBT, whereas the principal winter prey consumed by WF was mayfly nymphs and midge larvae. The predominance of spring prey for RBT shifted to newly-hatched midges and mayflies, whereas midge larvae predominated in the diet of WF. All types of prey consumed seasonally will be discussed and the prey consumed during other seasons will be compared with the winter/spring diets of fish and the relative abundance of macroinvertebrates in river bottom samples and drift net catches.

Thirteen Organizations Attend TU Deschutes Chapter Meeting

Conservation organization Trout Unlimited - through its Deschutes Chapter, Oregon Council and national staff – has embarked on an effort to significantly step up its efforts in the Upper Deschutes watershed. Groundwork has been underway over the last 12-15 months to provide better structure and support for the 390-member Deschutes Chapter, to identify specific areas of project work and advocacy within the existing large body of work already underway by local groups and agencies in the Upper Deschutes that will help realize the shared goal of restored rivers and coldwater fish populations in the Crooked, Upper and Middle Deschutes, Metolius and Whychus Creek basins.

"This re-investment of time and resources into the Upper Deschutes has three key elements, and the first of those is partnership," said TU's Alan Moore, based in the organization's Portland office. "We understand the critical need to dovetail our work here with those groups, agencies and individuals who've been doing yeoman's work here for decades to get the Deschutes to this point. We're committed 100 percent to that spirit of cooperation and the broader goals for the waters, lands and fish of the Deschutes River."

The second critical piece, says TUVice President of Volunteer Operations and Watershed Programs Bryan Moore, is a strong local core of volunteers. This is not TU's first foray in the Upper Deschutes, with the history of a strong Ochoco Chapter based in Prineville and national staff involvement throughout the relicensing of the Pelton-Round Butte hydro project. However, in recent years the chapter, now called the Deschutes Chapter, has gone somewhat dormant as local leaders and staffs cycled out and were not immediately replaced. Moore says better support from the TU organization and a commitment to conservation shared throughout the volunteer and staff ranks will be the key to a resurgent Deschutes Chapter.

Moore says the centerpiece of that shared commitment to the Upper Deschutes is the organization's 20th "Home Rivers Initiative," a staffed, organizationally supported long-term, on-the-ground conservation commitment in concert with the local grass roots. Home Rivers projects are grounded in partnerships within the watershed, funding and science support from national TU, and habitat conservation work on both private and public lands. The Upper Deschutes Home

Rivers initiative also will have a staffed policy and advocacy underpinning, as needed, within the project reaches and affected areas.

"On November 2,TU held an "open house" in Bend for current, past or prospective TU members interested in re-vitalizing the Chapter, other groups or agencies working with TU in the upper Deschutes, or anyone else interested to hear a bit more about TU's Home River's Initiatives and share their thoughts on how TU, its Deschutes Chapter and staff support could add value to the great conservation efforts already underway in the upper basin. Staff from TU's Portland, Jackson, WY and Arlington, VA officers attended, as well as two members of TU's Board of Trustees. Attendees and guests represented Central Oregon Flyfishers, Oregon Council of the Federation of Fly Fishers, Native Fish Society, Deschutes Land Trust, Deschutes River Conservancy, Upper Deschutes Watershed Council/Oregon Trout, Crooked River Watershed Council, Portland General Electric, Trust for Public Lands, Oregon Dept of Fish & Wildlife, US Fish & Wildlife Service, and the US Forest Service."

The Upper Deschutes Home Rivers Initiative is on track to have its local staff coordinator in place by spring of 2009. The results of the next meeting of the Deschutes Chapter of TU that was held December 15, at 6 p.m. at the Central Oregon Environmental Center in Bend will be published in the next

Why Did I become Involved in the Oregon Council? Dwight Klemin Vice President of Education



My fly fishing journey began in 1956. With fly rod in hand, a new fiberglass fly rod given to me by my parent on my eleventh birthday, I headed to Diamond Lake. The newly restored fishery offered large Kamloops trout that after being hooked liked the air more than the water. I failed to see that dance very often due in large part to my inability to cast my flies properly.

I saw the need to practice and to get help. I turned to the only source I knew: The Outdoor Life. I spent my early high school year's practicing with an Outdoor Life magazine in one hand and a fly rod in the other with limited success.

Now fast-forward past my four years in the Air Force to the Deschutes River fishing with my brother. My casting had not improved. It was still pitiful. My casting skills were lacking comfort, ease and consistency. Subsequent fall seasons found me trying to cast steelhead flies in brushy areas and wind infested rivers with little if any improvement. I decided it was time to conquer fly-casting or be conquered. In the early 1980's, I took a group lesson with the late, great Tom White. I realized that fly-casting was a skill to be developed and an art

form to be understood and studied. I made a commitment to understand and develop my casting skills.

In 2001 a friend and I decided to pursue the Federation of Fly Fishers Casting Instructor and the Two-handed Certification. Our goals were to gain certification and then teach others to develop fly-casting skills. We achieved the first goal, certification and proceeded to achieve the second goal through the formation of the North Santiam Spey Caster Charter Club. The club gave us an avenue to teach fly-casting skills while refining our skills.

As president of the club, I attended quarterly Oregon FFF Council meetings and took on the responsibilities as their Vice President of Education. I saw this as a great opportunity to promote flyfishing education and casting skills for other individuals that I had to search for during my fly-fishing development years.

The Oregon FFF Council sponsors an annual one-day Fly Tyer's Expo in Eugene. The Expo is a great event for fly fishermen and tiers; however, it did not include fly-casting as part of its program due to limited space and time. Here was an open opportunity to include fly-casting and fishing techniques.

The vision to include an "Education" component as a part of the NW Fly Tyer's Expo was born. Two years ago the expansion to a two-day Expo with educational and fly-casting classes and a venue move to Albany became a reality. The fly fisher now has resources in Oregon to become fully equipped for effective, efficient and enjoyable flyfishing through the NW Fly Tyer's and Fly Fishing Show.

A second vision was to develop Certified Fly Casting Instructor's Program. Its purpose: to elevate the casting abilities and skills at the club level. I was already a Certified Instructor and Two-handed

Certified but to accomplish this new goal, I needed to earn the Federation of Fly Fishers' Master's Certification. This certification required that I demonstrate mastery of single-handed fly-casting and develop coaching materials for subsequent candidates on the tasks required for certification. With the guidance from Casting Board of Governors Al Buhr, I have written a booklet, "A Guide To Fly Casting Instruction" to fully inform candidates of the requirements, give step-by-step instruction of the certification tasks involved, and outlines the process to pass the examination. At this time twenty-two people have formally been involved with the Oregon Education Certification Program.

Hard work has its benefits: new friends, enjoyable fishing, proficient casting abilities, and confidence in any fly-fishing situation. The big plus is the satisfaction knowing that a beginner, a developing, or an advance fly fisher in Oregon has the resources to improve casting skills and fly fishing knowledge.

Through the Oregon Council, I have been able to give back to the fly-fishing community a resource for developing as a fly fisher and to develop my fly-casting skill.

My involvement has had the unattended consequences of effective, efficient and enjoyable growth of my sport and hobby. Your involvement can also have a positive outcome on others and yourself. Consider Involvement...
